# **Developing the Envirocentre**

Nestled between the Kaitake Ranges and the moana, Oākura School has been doing the hard mahi in what is called the Envirocentre, which is a bush clad gully adjacent the school playing fields.

This space has been the hive of activity with several classes cleaning up the dreaded tradescantia, some additional plantings, the construction of a set of new steps that will link together two existing paths, and a viewing seat which has spectacular views over the ngahere and up to Patuha.

The steps and seat have been designed and built by a group of senior boys, who are not afraid to get stuck in. The steep hillside steps required excavation and shoring up by using offcuts from building work that is being done



at the kura, which otherwise would have gone to landfill.

Looking for funds to construct the seat, the tane fundraised to buy cement and materials suitable for the seat. The results speak for themselves.

Well done to everyone involved in making this beautiful space even more user friendly, and to teacher Lexi Harcourt for supporting the tamariki in realising their aspirations.

The new steps, pathway and seat were officially opened on the 15<sup>th</sup> December with a ribbon cutting ceremony and a korero by principal, Lynne Hepworth, acknowledging and congratulating the senior boys in creating this wonderful addition to the Envirocentre.



# **Spotswood Primary School**

## Reigniting the waste streams

Spotswood Primary School's Enviroclub, led by teacher Sonja Short, has been focusing on ways to reduce and recycle waste in the kura and to make recycling fun for the tamariki. Sonja managed to secure funding for the project through the New Plymouth District Councils Waste Minimisation Levy to help construct a waste Mini Hub in the kura.

A group of the Enviroclub's year 3 & 4 students were responsible for designing and painting the striking waste eating monsters that adorn the front panel of the mini hub. The structure itself and the way the chutes and bins are set up make for ease of use for the tamariki to use and operate.

The beauty of the Mini Hub is that items that are usually sent to landfill are separated and recycled wherever possible, and the wider kura community are able to bring in recyclable items as well.

Making recycling and minimising waste sent to landfill fun is a win for our environment, and the tamariki love 'feeding' the forever hungry waste monsters.

# Uruti School

## Mastering Ecological Building

Uruti School tamariki are a handy bunch of students to have around when there is something to build. This year's efforts have included the building of an eco-build bamboo tee-pee in the playground and the building of pekapeka (bat) homes.

The building of the pekapeka homes came about due to investigations of the local environment prior to the commencement of the Mount Messenger bypass project which revealed that pekapeka habitats were present.



Deconstructing pallets and building



Recognising that the potential disruption to pekapeka habitat loss could be a problem, the kura front footed the issue and took action. Using a pekapeka home design, the tamariki deconstructed untreated wooden pallets, then began sawing and nailing the pieces together to make a palatial home fit for a lucky pekapeka. Another great initiative in taking action in and for the environment.





# Kaponga School

## Creating outdoor learning spaces

There are many areas at Kaponga that have student groups constantly developing with new ideas. One of these ideas came about as the result of a student teacher telling the students about a track he had made through a patch of bush while he was a student there.

A group of students then decided to recreate this track. They found evidence of the original track by identifying rocks which had been used as edging. They then set to work with grubbers and spades to clear weeds and to scalp the track.

They then got busy on the wheelbarrows and buckets spreading lime chips and creating a rock border. Their hard work paid off with a fantastic bush track which honours the mahi







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of the previous students and will be a great resource for current and future students to enjoy.

# Tawhiti School

## Developing the Maara Kai

Over the past 2 terms, Tawhiti School garden group have been planning and developing a kai maara on the site of their old cycle track. They have been busy building raised garden beds and filling them using the lasagne garden method.







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They have built a worm farm and put in a potato and kumara patch. They have planted several different fruit trees and vines to start their orchard. Underneath each tree they have planted comfrey as an organic fertiliser and mulch system.

They have also planted sunflowers along the fence to create a sense of fun.



This work is ongoing but they space is already looking amazing! We look forward to seeing it develop further.

# Kakaramea School

# Localised curriculum

At the beginning of Term 4 Kakaramea visited Pariroa Pa (their local Pa) to learn about local histories and to participate in a range of cool activities.

They learnt that Dalvanius Prime came from Pariroa Pa and about how he composed the waiata Poie.

Students got to learn how to perform part of the 'Poi e' song, with poi, from one of the original performers.

This was definitely a fantastic opportunity which they will savour for years to come. They also made kawakawa balm to take away.







# Waitoriki School

## Green Gold Reflection and Celebration

Waitoriki Schools Reflection journey was deep and wide reaching. With encouragement they also evaluated the concepts of social sustainability with how they cared for one another and their wider community throughout the ups and downs of Covid.

Decision Making day dawned with a chilly wind, but that was nothing against the wonderful warmth of the welcome extended to the manuhiri, led by the Kapa haka group. The tamariki showed us around and explained the many aspects of Waitoriki School life from the "Loose Parts Playground" to Waitoriki Wares, the Maara kai, Waitoriki Whenua, Forest school, Kauri Akomanga, (the tactile classroom, where the placing of a personalised rock reserves the game or activity to be continued later), and so much more.

As impressive as all that was, we were also so delighted to hear of the depth of integration of the Enviroschools kaupapa in the school Charter and policies. Top down support with excellent support from the Board and Principal as well as passionate teachers and empowered students really set this school up to being an excellent Green-Gold Enviroschools. Principal Teresa and lead Enviro Teacher Jo often say "this is just what we do".

After all the presentations, discussions and tours we were treated to a delicious taste of \*Small Stream Cuisine with tables beautifully set with placemats sewn by the tamariki.

A few weeks later we returned to celebrate and present the signed certificate and the prized sticker for the Enviroschools sign at the gate.

A massive congratulations to everyone who makes up the Waitoriki School community. Your ongoing journey is inspiring.

# **Beyond Green Gold Reflection and Celebration**

The first Green-Gold Enviroschool is Taranaki just Reflected again at what it feels like Beyond Green-Gold. Their Enviroschools journey has only become deeper and richer since then.

Staff and students have come and gone in the interim so the time was ripe for a review; to take stock and celebrate all that has happened and all that they have learnt.

Toko have been on a deep and gentle cultural journey, demonstrated by the beautiful powhiri and the amazing strength of the Kapa haka group.

With much to celebrate it was key to focus in on some key areas to share the depth of the kaupapa. On Decision Making Day we enjoyed a general sharing and without a doubt guests were treated to discussions and presentations about their recycled art pieces throughout the school, the distilling project, chickens, bees, the heritage orchard and maara kai through to using the produce to make a range of products for sale at the stall outside the gate.

One of the most impressive areas was the succession of the Enviro Leaders. Leaders are chosen each year to champion tours to the public and support action across every class. Tuakana teina is built into these roles with presentations no 'owned' only by the confident students.

All of this is underpinned by strong support from the Principal and staff so that the Enviroschools kaupapa is woven throughout school life, incorporated into every classrooms learning and out into the school community.

# Green Gold Reflection and Celebration

Another school whose Holistic Reflection process felt drawn out due to Covid - but the time came in November to share what they had uncovered, remembered and actioned since we reflected at Silver.

We were welcomed with an awesome whole school powhiri led by the Kapa haka group. What followed was a comprehensive insight into the many aspects of the life of this large primary school and the way the Enviroschools kaupapa is championed throughout.

Tamariki from the SPS Tuis envirogroup showed us around some of the key ongoing projects in the school eg bees. predator trapping, chickens, bug motels, scarecrows for the scarecrow competition, waste systems,



maara kai, orchard and stunning artwork around the grounds etc.

We also visited the play-based classroom and heard from the Principal about how the Enviroschools kaupapa has been incorporated into the school's policies and systems. eg the groundsperson is fully onboard with the Enviroschools kaupapa and works with students on maintenance and repairs around the school grounds, giving them a sense of ownership of their kura.
