Weaving in Waitara

As part of the Sustainable Communities through Kai initiative we have been able to support Waitara-based Enviroschools to start their weaving journey. This included working with Gypsy and Karen from KareNZ Kitz plus our Enviroschools team to learn tikanga around growing, harvesting, preparing and weaving the harakeke. Students also learnt about the difference between flax and harakeke. This term our Enviroschools staff will run workshops in school with attendees to support the tuakana teina aspect of teaching others and learning together with the next steps of creating kono and waikawa.




What our schools have been up to



Mokoia Beach Litter Survey

Enviroschools Taranaki staff are now Facilitators for the Litter Surveys through Sustainable Coastlines. The senior students at Mokoia School, along with Ben Knight from Sustainable Coastlines and their Enviroschools facilitator, conducted a beach litter survey at Manutahi Beach. Together, they collected 139 pieces of litter in the 2000 square metre quadrant. The vast majority of this litter was plastic. The students separated all of the litter into categories and then imputed the data into the Litter Intelligence website. The students intend to monitor the site by conducting further surveys over the next year. Well done team!



Midhirst School

Building food resilience through Permaculture

Since Midhirst became an Enviroschool they have been doing a deep dive into what sustainability means to them. This has incorporated many aspects of their connection to place, people, their history and how they might be able to build on that. One way has been through regular engagement with Sue Rine who brings her Horticulture and Permaculture expertise to work alongside the school and Whakaahurangi Marae on food systems thinking. As their learning has grown, so has their action for and in the environment. They are now developing a food forest.



Opūnake High School continue to work on the Opūnake Loop Trail

On the last day of Term 2, Year 13 students and teachers gathered at the Waiaua River bank to continue restoration planting - part of an ongoing project involving community groups and kura. In 2020 Opūnake High helped plant 3000 native trees and this year another 2500 to 3000 will be planted. Students, teachers and members of the Loop Trail Committee planted about 300 trees and 50 flaxes in this session. They also mulched around the trees with sheep dags to suppress weeds. It is awesome to see the kura and community working towards a common goal of restoring Opūnake's ecosystems.



What do you do when we're all so busy being busy and can't get together?

We bring in the cluster concept and work collaboratively. That's what Richard and Lauree are doing with the top North Taranaki Enviroschools. They've been running tech groups, action days and planning enviro events with a cluster of schools to maximise learning. If you think this might work for your group, let us know.



Weaving in Hāwera High School

A group of students were keen to learn different weaving techniques. They began with learning about the tikanga around harvesting harakeke, and which harakeke is best for weaving. They harvested what we needed and began the weaving process. Initially the students learnt to weave three different putiputi. They also learnt how to make harakeke lace using a pasta machine. Once each student had made at least one bouquet each, they learnt how to prepare harakeke for weaving a kono. This involved using a haehae to get strips of an even width, then softening each strip to remove moisture content. The students were very quick learners and proved to be natural weavers. We wish them all the best as they continue to develop their skills further.



Moturoa are off to Goat Island

Moturoa School have been busy little bees preparing fundraising items out of sustainably sourced materials and held a wonderful evening of sharing selling and feeding the supportive hoards who attended. The students presented and ran the evening sharing information about their long term sustainability journey. Attendees got to hear from past and present students about what drives their action for the environment and what their plans are for the future. It was brilliant! The fundraising evening raised \$2,179 of the \$5,000 needed to get to **Goat Island**. They also have a Quiz Night coming up soon so watch out for that. If you haven't heard about Goat Island before, check out this link to see more and the reason why we all love it so much. Speaking of learning - most of the school have also done a field trip to look at the rocky shores and who lives there. Creatures were investigated and treated with respect.



Waitara East delve deep and look wide

Waitara East recently applied for and won a TREEmendous fund which helped them get Bug Man Rudd Kleinpaste and Shark Man Riley Elliott to come to school to work with the whole school on marine/ocean conservation and the importance of sharks as well as all things bug-related. Tiri Bailey even bought in some Piharau or Lampreys (sucker fish) which were a real hit. 'Ka kitea a Matariki, ka rere te korokoro' (when Matariki is seen, the lamprey migrate). Rudd took the students through some interesting and engaging lessons with our native bugs and tamariki learnt to respect the cycles of nature way more as well as hearing more about the importance each insect plays in the cycle of nature. Teachers also really loved their hikoi with Rudd the following day. Rudd is a huge advocate for learning outside the classroom and that was the cool focus.

Highlight on a new Enviroschool

Bell Block School launch their Enviroschools Journey

Enviroschools lead teacher for Bell Block Amy Foreman really embraced the principles of sustainability and student empowerment. With her enthusiastic Year 7/8 class, Amy is supporting their exploration and vision of what sustainability looks like with practical mahi both within and outside of the classroom. For example, Amy and her tamariki have been instrumental in re-establishing the beginnings of a maara kai by reusing previously dismantled raised garden bed materials to construct several beds at the rear of the school. Filled with rich soil, the garden beds have already been planted out with a range of winter vegetable plants.

In early July, permaculture guru Sue Rine and Enviroschools Facilitator, Richard Carr, held a composting workshop with Amy's class. A presentation was given which explained the reasons for composting and the processes behind how to create it. Lots of discussion was generated on the advantages of composting material which would otherwise be sent to landfill or wasted.

A practical exercise followed with the construction of compost bins from pallets and a demonstration of how to

fill the bins with appropriate material. The saying 'many hands make light work' certainly applied with lots of willing helpers as the picture below shows.

Next on the agenda is the planning and construction of an outdoor learning space in an area adjacent a classroom block on the north west side of the kura.

This will involve student input in planning to maximise the opportunities for students to experience developing a greenfields site into something special. Initial ideas include incorporating planting of native species along with fruit trees. Other features may include spaces in which to sit and pathways that meander through the space



which take advantage of what will eventually become established.

No doubt there will be many other great ideas that the Bell Block School tamariki will be able to explore to help

The Enviroschools team enjoyed being a part of the Kahui Ako Teacher PD day this term as always. We shared a sample of what we're doing with schools at the moment and what's on offer coming up. Working with the Kāhui Ako is great as the majority of the schools and all kindergartens are Enviroschools. Through the Eye of the Lens Taranaki


