Conserving Threatened Species An *ex situ* Conservation Strategy for *Rhododendron* in New Zealand

The New Zealand Rhododendron ex situ Conservation Project is a collaboration between scientists, collection holders, botanists and conservation authorities in New Zealand and internationally. The aim is to analyse Rhododendron collections in New Zealand in relation to those held globally, and to develop management strategies, nationally and for individual collections, that contribute to the conservation of Rhododendron species. The project is led by Marion MacKay of Massey University, and participants include Pukeiti Rhododendron Trust, Taranaki Regional Council and New Zealand Rhododendron Association. International links are maintained to the Global Rhododendron Conservation Consortium (UK), the Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden

(USA) and other international groups associated with *Rhododendron* conservation.

Ex situ conservation (where species that are at risk of extinction in their native habitat are conserved by growing them in living collections in botanic gardens or similar sites) sits within the framework of the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation and its 16 Targets, but particularly Target 8 which aims to have 75% of threatened species held in ex situ collections by 2020¹. Key factors for success in ex situ conservation are presence of a range of genetically diverse plants of wild-source origin, correct identification and labelling of each individual plant, detailed and accurate record keeping, and skilled cultivation to ensure successful growth and excellent plant health.

Rhododendron is a complex genus of some 1300 taxa (species, subspecies and varieties), of northern hemisphere origin. Taxa are found from lowland subtropical forest to alpine tundra, and have growth habits ranging from forest trees to epiphytes and creeping swamp plants. Recent conservation assessments, using international conservation criteria, resulted in 730 taxa being Red Listed², that is, those species are deemed to be at risk or threatened with extinction in their native habitat. Cultivation in *ex situ* collections is one way to conserve Red List taxa; 1002 taxa are in cultivation

internationally², with some 500 taxa present in New Zealand collections including Red List taxa³ and



several hundred individual accessions of wild-source origin.

The broad aims of the New Zealand project are to (i) analyse the range of taxa held in New Zealand collections, including taxa that have been present historically, (ii) propagate and disperse those taxa that are held on limited sites, (iii) work with collection holders to analyse individual collections and develop management strategies that facilitate the conservation of threatened taxa held at those sites, e.g. increasing the diversity of each taxon held, (iv) use laboratory analysis, when appropriate, to assess identity and genetic diversity of collections, and (iv) work with international associates to assist with conservation of *Rhododendron* taxa globally.

Key activities for participating sites in this project include:

- Collaborating with the project team to analyse the collection at that site and determine its significance for conservation, including the identification of taxa that should be propagated.
- Ensuring accurate plant identification and labelling, with an associated set of detailed records so that individual plants can be located, propagated as necessary, and tracked when sent to other collections.
- Working with the project team to determine a programme of collection development, propagation, and collection administration appropriate to that collection.
- Collaborating with the project team, and other New Zealand collections, to develop a network of suitable sites in New Zealand that together can successfully conserve the range of *Rhododendron* taxa held in New Zealand.

Rhododendron tuba

R. tuba is a vireya rhododendron from Mt Daymen, SE Papua New Guinea, growing at an altitude of 2500 to 3000m.

It has long tubular flowers that are white or white with a touch of pink and very pleasantly scented. It tends to flower en masse once a year in late autumn and lightens up the garden at a time when there is less in flower.

It is easy to grow in a frost free situation and is a reliable plant.



Toutouwai Back with a Song of Joy

The return of toutouwai (North Island robin) to Pukeiti after a century or more is cause for celebration on more than one level.

The little songsters have been seen on multiple occasions near Founders Café. It's great news for all of us who value our precious biodiversity, especially species like this which are found only in New Zealand and have been in decline. They'd been extinct from Egmont National Park for 112 years.

Their return also vindicates the intensive predator control taking place in and around Pukeiti, and shows us what success looks like. If we keep up the momentum, we can look forward to these and other native biodiversity treasures recovering and thriving.

Pukeiti is literally the front line in Restore Kaitake, part of the wider Towards Predator-Free Taranaki project. A virtual barrier of 1300 traps is strung across the width of the property so that it and the area below, all the way to the sea, can become a Zero Possum Zone.

It's a bold plan but it's been achieved elsewhere on a smaller scale. And these aren't just any traps. They're monitored wirelessly, so trappers need focus only on the ones that need attention. And they can be turned on and off remotely and automatically – so they're left off during the day when possums aren't active but innocent two-legged creatures are.

Meanwhile, the Taranaki Mounga Project is leading an intensive rattrapping program in a 1000 hectare block on the north eastern side of Mount Taranaki below North Egmont, with 2160 self-resetting A24 gas powered traps, creating a safe environment for robin to survive and breed. Almost 100 robin have now been released in this safe area since 2017.

Their sighting at Pukeiti, 15km away, shows that with predator control, robins are breeding and spreading to other areas. This is what we can expect to see more of as our community works together removing predators as part of Towards Predator-Free Taranaki.

With Restore Kaitake gathering pace, we can expect to see more such wins. Communities and schools and farmers have been mobilised and backyard trapping is the talk of the town in Oakura and Okato. The return of other native birds, such as kākā and kiwi, is no longer just a dream.

Because the terrain here is so rugged, 1080 bait remains a highly effective tool and is being used on Egmont National Park and some adjacent land. For more information about this bait, visit www.1080facts.co.nz.
