An Exciting Year Planned

Last year, to say the least, was a traumatic year. Plans made had to be altered or abandoned as a Covid-cloud of concern hung over us. But now in 2021 there is hope: new exciting initiatives are being planned that provide a positive outlook for the Trust and Pukeiti, provided of course the country's control of the pandemic holds.

In many ways the fall of the Giant Rata at Pukeiti mirrored the year's trauma.

A crack appeared in its trunk. The crack grew daily and the mighty 1000 year old tree looked about to topple. If this happened, its hollow base, a destination for inquisitive children, could have imposed a real danger for anyone trapped inside. Over recent years other old ratas dotted throughout Pukeiti's forest have fallen without notice and the decision was made to have the giant felled to avoid any disaster. Ironically because of the eradication of opossums the upper branches of this great tree were gradually being refurbished with new growth. The tree even flowered again. But all this added to the weight of the crown which could have further weakened the structure.

Skillfully the arborists felled the tree and it dropped with a thud into the surrounding forest. The stump showed that the original supporting rimu on which the rata had established epiphytically all those years ago was rotten, and the web of coalesced rata roots could not prop up the giant's crown.

The fallen tree will remain where it fell, rot, and in time be covered by a new growth of forest trees encouraged by the light gap created. The canopy of these will add to the mosaic of greens, made up of different species of various ages, characteristic of mature New Zealand forests.

Other recent developments such as the initial work forming the cycle track to Oakura has led to the closure of some walking tracks, extending and repositioning others. One of these, the new Rowe Walk, leads from the Maxwell to the Ireland Walk and passes through a range of less common species including a grove of tawa trees.

The Members' Committee of the Trust has planned new activities for the coming year providing

additional benefits for members. These include:

- Four new Guided Walks to which the public will be invited and hopefully encourage them to become new members.
- Additions to the Members' List of Plants for sale: Along with a good range of plants the list features two new Pukeiti hybrids, recently

registered: 'Maddy Bern', a cross between an *R. maddenii* and 'Bernice', and 'Koha', a chance vireya hybrid. As well, members are invited to take part in the distributed collection of clones of rare species, propagated as part of the *ex-situ* conservation programme, by purchasing plants from the first batch of species offered for sale.

Each plant will be supplied with a permanent label. Purchaser details will be retained and held on the data base thus enabling the details of the *ex-situ* collection, such as the best habitat and successful growing conditions for a particular species to be assessed, so helping its conservation.

PLANTS of Interest at Pukeiti

Dactylorhiza maculata

Family: Orchidaceae subfamily: Orchidoideae

D. maculata, known as the heath spotted orchid. It is widespread in mountainous regions across much of Europe from Portugal and Iceland east to Russia. It is also found in Algeria, Morocco and western Siberia.

It is a terrestrial orchid. The flowers are in spikes 5-10cm long from mid-spring to late summer. It is best grown in moist but well-drained humus-rich soil in partial shade and is undemanding.

Currently it is flowering beautifully in the covered walkway.







Aesculus parviflora

Order: Sapindales Family: Sapindaceae

A. pariviflora, the bottlebrush buckeye, is a species of suckering shrub native to the south-eastern United States primarily in Alabama but also Georgia and northern Florida. The name buckeye refers to the resemblance of the nutlike seed, which has a pale patch on a shiny red-brown surface, to the eye of a deer.

Over time it will grow to 3-4m high and 3-8m wide. It has erect panicles of white flowers with prominent stamens. Is happy in part shade to full shade though it is in full sun at Pukeiti.

It flowers at Pukeiti mid-January to early February and when in flower is very obvious on the left hand side at the beginning of the Larcom Walk.

Pukeiti Members' Plant List

Welcome to the plant list for 2021.

This is the first year that we have plants specifically propagated by the *ex-situ* Conservation Team for purposes of preservation of these rare and endangered species. Some of the plants are from seed brought in from the USA, others have been propagated at Pukeiti and by other members of the Conservation Team, from plants collected at Pukeiti and around the country. The best way to ensure species are safe from extinction is to share them around and so they are being offered on our Plant List. We also of course have a selection of Tawa Glen-propagated rhododendrons, including, for the first time a good selection of Tawa Glen-propagated vireyas from the Pukeiti collection.

We have only very small numbers of most of the Pukeitipropagated plants. Although it is a little bit of a lottery as to whether you get one of these special plants, by having them on the list it does give members the chance to obtain plants that are often rare in the wild and seldom, if ever offered in retail outlets.

If the name of the plant has 'ss' at the end, it means it is one of these and you need to order it quickly. Remember, we work on a first come, first served basis so if you really want one of the plants I strongly suggest ordering immediately by return e-mail. If sending your order by e-mail, just scan your completed order form and e-mail it to cattrobson@gmail.com. If you don't have scan facilities, type out your list and email it back and then send the order form separately by mail. This must be sent to reach Heather by Friday 12 March.

I continue to keep a record of those plants where demand exceeds supply and which are not readily available from garden centres. Should we be offered those plants in a following year, I offer them preferentially to those members who missed out previously. That way, if you miss out first time, you will hopefully get another opportunity to purchase it. Several members have been given priority for plants they missed out on previously. For future reference, we keep a record of the name, address and contact details of members who purchase *Rhododendron* species. These plants are part of our Conservation Project and their traceability is important should we ever need to ask you to let us have some cuttings for propagation and conservation purposes.

The letter attached to the number will indicate where it has been sourced from:

P = Pukeiti:

T = Tawa Glen Nursery;

M = from miscellaneous sources.

The plants come in a variety of different sized pots this year. This will be noted on the plant list.

We do encourage members ordering plants to collect them in person, if possible. This optimises the condition of the plants you receive and decreases the cost to you. We would prefer those people living in New Plymouth to collect their plants from 12A Tamati Place, New Plymouth on Friday 19 March (between 1:00pm & 5:00pm) or by alternative arrangements made with Heather Robson (06) 757–2460. If this isn't possible you will be able to collect you plant orders from Pukeiti on Saturday 27 March (Please tick this box on the order form so your plants can be taken up to Pukeiti). For those who can't collect their own order we will again be using Fastway Couriers. Apart from a couple of problems last year (very likely as a result of the demands of the Covid lock-down), they have provided us and you with an excellent service over the past decade but should there be any problem with the delivery product then please tell the courier first before notifying Heather.

All plants are believed to be correctly named and we endeavour to describe them as accurately as possible but size and flowering is a rough guide only as this can vary according to local conditions. Plants grown from seed may also vary from the type description.

We are changing how we ask you to pay for your plants this year. When we package your plants, we will include an invoice with them and on receipt of this we ask you to go online and pay by internet banking. Details will be with the invoice. If you have difficulty with internet banking, please contact your bank for assistance.

There is no minimum order required. The guide below will give you an indication of what the freight charge is likely to be.

Rhododendron Species

(2.5L pots unless otherwise specified)

- 1 T R. burmanicum Medium sized lance-shaped leaves are scaly on both sides, lending a lovely golden brown effect. Sweetly scented flowers are tubular shaped and yellow to greenish. 1.2m. Early. \$20.00
- 2 T R. edgeworthii An evergreen shrub, growing to 1m. The leaves are covered with very fine hairs (dark orange to pale beige-brown.)

 Flowers are bell-shaped, white flushed pink, with a yellow blotch at base and very fragrant.

 \$20.00
- 3 P* *R. maddenii* ssp. *maddenii* (T3/2012-1007A) (ss) 1L pot. It has been at least 7 years since we have offered this wonderful species. Scented white trumpets in November on a handsome plant. 2m. \$20.00
- 4 M* *R. mucronulatum* RHS 2018 17092. A curiosity. The first rhododendron to bloom in late winter-spring. Flowers are mauve pink. It is interesting to note that although deciduous, *R. mucronulatum* is not an azalea, but is a deciduous rhododendron that resembles an azalea. It is often bred with evergreen azaleas to form fragrant hybrid evergreen azaleas. approx. 1L pot. \$20.00
- 5 P R. scopulorum (ss) 1L pot. A rare member of the Maddenia Rhododendron subsection. White, scented flowers on an open growing shrub to 1.5m. \$25.00

Azalea Species

- 6 P *R. occidentale* ARS 2019-46 (ss) 13cm pot. Seedling grown deciduous rhododendrons. This is a variable species with trusses of 3-25 sweetly fragrant flowers in early summer. In cold climates the glossy mid-green foliage turns orange and yellow in autumn. Native to the Western States of the USA. \$20.00
- 7 M R. occidentale ARS 2018 106 (ss) These plants are from a different seed lot to the ones above. Pot size approx. 1L. \$20.00
- 8 M *R. luteum* orange ARS 2018 175 (ss) A bushy deciduous shrub of open growth to 4m tall, with oblong leaves turning orange, purple and red in autumn. This special form of *R. luteum* has very fragrant, orange, funnel-shaped flowers, 5cm in width, which are produced in late spring and early summer. Great for colder climates. Pot size approx. 1L. \$20.00

Vireya Rhododendron Species

(2.5L pots unless otherwise specified)

9 P *R. dielsianum* (1976-170) (ss) Collected by Graham Smith in PNG 1983. Pretty Pale pink curved, tubular flowers. Bush 1.5m easy in cultivation.

\$25.00

- 10 T *R. jasminiflorum.* The fragrant flowers are white or white flushed pink with a long tubular corolla and abruptly flared lobes. 1L pot. \$25.00
- 11 T *R. rugosum*. (ss) Handsome deep green foliage with very prominent veins. Flowers are a lovely pink with up to 14 per umbel. 2L pot. \$25.00
- 12 P* *R. macgregoriae* (T3/1980-1009B) (ss) 13cm pot. Large tropical evergreen shrubs or small trees (typically much smaller in cultivation) with shiny leaves in pseudo-whorls. The abundantly produced yellow, shortly tubular flowers with flaring lobes are held in rounded trusses of up to 15 flowers. Easily grown and extremely floriferous (flowering throughout the year), this is one of the best vireyas for the beginner. Grows up to 2m.
- 13 P *R. sumatranum* (ss) It is over 7 years since we have listed this species. Small orange tubular flowers with a red flush, rounded green leaves densely scaled. Indonesia. \$25.00
- 14 P *R. stapfianum* (ss) 13cm pot. Usually epiphytic in the wild. A slow growing plant up to 1m with crinkly green foliage covered with white hairs on both surfaces. White thin trumpet-shaped flowers are up to 18 per truss and are sometimes scented. Indonesia. \$25.00
- 15 T *R.tuba* This upright shrubby species has white flushed pink, long and curved, trumpet-shaped flowers that hang in large clusters from the tips of the branches. This easily grown vireya reliably produces its stunning flowers each spring. 2L pot. \$25.00

- 16 T R. 'Alcesta'. A lovely low growing plant with a tidy rounded habit of growth. Flowers are a light lemon yellow with dark yellow spots on the upper lobe. 1m. \$20.00
- 17 T R. 'Alpine Meadow'. Small growing and compact forming an attractive mound. Covered in pure white flowers. Early. 70cm. \$20.00
- 18 T R. 'Beefeater'. With R. elliottii as one of the parents of this plant it of course has lovely red flowers in a nice truss. \$20.00

- 19 T *R.* 'Belle Heller'. Medium sized rounded trusses of quite large white flowers that have a stunning golden blotch on the upper lobe. Midseason. 1.8m. \$20.00
- 20 T *R.* 'Durham Light'. Open funnel flowers, 5-6 per umbel, greenish yellow flushed pink buds, open light primrose to cream, greenish throat, scented. compact 1.5m. \$20.00
- 21 T *R.* 'Grenadier'. Flower widely funnel-shaped, 3½" across, waxy, vivid red with a deep black throat. Held in ball-shaped trusses with about 12 flowers. 1.8m. \$20.00
- 22 T R. 'Impi'. A very late flowering rhododendron that is deepest burgundy/black red. Upright tidy growth. 1.2m. \$20.00
- 23 T *R.* 'Karen Triplett'. Yellow flowers that glow in the night light. Lovely bronze spring growth on a dense and compact bush. Mid season. 1.5m. \$20.0
- 24 T *R.* 'Katie'. (*polyandrum* x 'Sirius') Felix Jury hybrid. (ss) Compact and upright with distinctive creamy orange flowers on dark foliage.

 Many typical bell shaped flowers in loose trusses. Lightly scented. 2.5m Mid. \$20.00
- 25 T *R.* 'Lemon Lodge'. A New Zealand hybrid with huge, primrose-yellow flowers on a compact plant. Very free flowering and a highly sought after plant. 1.5m. Oct flowering. \$20.00
- 26 P R. 'Maddy Bern'. (R. maddenii ssp. maddenii x R. 'Bernice') (T3/2014-0015) FIRST TIME OFFERED TO THE PUBLIC be in quick.

 Rhododendron 'Maddy Bern' one of the latest hybrids to be registered from the Pukeiti collection and offered here first. Gloriously full pink trumpets with a gorgeous scent on a handsome dark foliaged plant. Late flowering.

- 27 T *R*. 'Oldenburg'. A compact rounded plant with roundish leaves. The bell-shaped flowers in loose truss are light pink. Early -mid season. 1.5 x 1.5 m. \$20.00
- 28 P R. 'Opal Dawn'. (*davidsonianum* 'Exbury Pink' X 'Countess of Haddington') (ss) Compact NZ shrub to 1.5m x 2m. Flowers: 4-5 open funnels per umbel, rose opal in bud opening cream with pink flush, fading to white with greenish yellow dorsal flare. Scented. \$20.00
- 29 T *R.* 'Parisienne'. Very bright sulphur yellow flowers are held in loose trusses and are lightly fragrant. This plant will cope with a sunny position. Protect buds from heavy frosts. Early. 1.2m. \$20.00
- 30 T *R.* 'Platinum Ice'. (*augustinii* x *maddenii*) A Mark Jury hybrid that forms a compact upright shrub with attractive glossy leaves. It has lovely long pale lilac buds which open to wide funnels that fade out to white. Lightly fragrant. 1.8m. November. \$20.00

- 50 T Bergenia Bressingham Ruby'. Exotic looking plants with large, shiny heart-shaped leaves. Ruby pink flowers appear during winter.

- 51 P Helenium bigelovii 'Walstrand': Its common name is 'Sneezewood', not because it causes allergies but because it was originally used for snuff. The flowers are bright rusty-yellow at first turning a more reddish-brown as they age. One plant can produce as many as 20 flower heads, either one per branch or in branching arrays. - 59 P *Narcissus* 'Jenny'. A charming, small daffodil with cute flowers, 5cm across, featuring a yellow trumpet surrounded by white sepals.
