Like many of us I have watched with amazement the transformation of the lawn. I keep reminding myself of that saying 'Fools and children', however it has set me wondering how in a garden of rhododendrons and native forest such a magnificent expanse of lawn came about.

Initially the clearing was Pukeiti's stock bed, as seen in some wonderful photographs.

The idea of a lawn arose in 1957, from John Goodwin's 'desire for spaciousness, but wresting a svelte lawn from what was originally a swamp was never going to be easy.

Des Corbett well remembers the day he and others assisted Rob Bayly in the seed sowing.

Field tiles, with a finger gap between them, were put in. Manuka (*Leptospermum scoparium*) was placed over the top as a kind of brush, then dirt covered everything up. Finally the seed was sown. The lawn looked really beautiful. We went up onto the veranda to have a few beers when it started to rain.

We said, "Hooray, here comes the rain. The grass will come up." About two hours and five inches of rain later, we could see the brush at the bottom of the lawn.'

A second attempt to sow the lawn also failed but finally with the aid of a Farmall Cub tractor, discs and a blade and much raking, there was success.

John Goodwin confided that once laid there was a struggle to keep the lawn, as people wanted to put beds of azaleas in this "nice open space". (page 30)

For many years the lawn was mown using a Gravely Reel mower with extensions and a willing worker walking behind. The resulting turf was a source of pride. Then ride-on rotary mowers were acquired and the gardeners' time and legs appreciated the change.

Many activities have featured on the lawn including family picnics, children's games,

weddings, musical performances, garden festival activities, and once or twice a helicopter landing.

The lawn has been and continues to be a huge success. John Goodwin's foresight has been well rewarded. Spaciousness. Thank you John.

Collecting at Heritage Park and its importance in the National Strategy

Heritage Park, the home garden of the New Zealand Rhododendron Association in the heart of the Rangitikei, has a unique microclimate for the growing of rhododendrons – as clearly demonstrated by the plants growing there.

On February 4 this year I collected cuttings in my new role as Rhododendron Collections Officer for the Taranaki Regional Council. My brief is to grow the Pukeiti collection, both physically with the number of individual taxa and their variants, and intellectually with quality information about the plants and profile. I also work with others around New Zealand to implement the National Strategy for Rhododendrons, with the aim of disseminating plants to other collections to guarantee survival of endangered taxa rather than take the proverbial eggs-in-one-basket approach.

At Heritage Park Lindsay Davies kindly assisted me in the collection of cuttings from 19 different taxa. These cuttings, plus the accompanying data, have started their journey into the Pukeiti Collection. But it doesn't stop there. A key benefit to Heritage Park is the potential return of young propagules to boost and back up the Park's own collection as well as the chance to share plants further afield.

As a parting gift to Heritage Park, I left in Lindsay's care a young plant, *Zenobia pulverulenta*, to add a bit more ericaceae flavour to the plantings. This is a North American member of the rhododendron family and it can be semi-evergreen to deciduous, depending on climate. It has showy white, bell-shaped flowers, very similar to those of *Pieris* in the spring/summer. These are followed in the autumn with an attractive reddish- purple leaf colouring, creating a display that should suit the park well.

As the National Strategy work continues, good relationships between all of the rhododendron collection gardens is vital to the success of New Zealand's efforts to contribute to the conservation of the genus. I look forward to continuing the relationship with both Heritage Park and its members/ gardeners into the future.

Care of Wood from *R. protistum* 'Pukeiti'

Peter Fryer says that it is important to remember that this is wood and it will move. It needs regular oil or waxes to keep it looking good.

All treatment Peter has given it has been food safe and if you want to use your wood for food ensure that any further treatment you give it is with food-safe products. To clean it afterwards generally a wipe with a clean, damp cloth will be all it needs.



Members' Plant List

This year again we have a good selection of rhododendrons from Tawa Glenn Nursery and we also have a selection of plants that have been propagated for the TRC Gardens and are surplus to their needs. Many of these plants are very special, often rare in the wild and seldom offered in retail outlets. There are generally only 2 – 5 of each of the Pukeiti plants available. If the description of the plant has 'ss' at the end, it means it is one of these and you need to order it quickly. Remember we work on a first come, first served basis so if you really want one of the plants I strongly suggest ordering immediately by return mail. This can advantage New Plymouth members so, to make it fairer for everyone, we accept e-mailed order forms. Just scan your completed order form and e-mail it to cattrobson@gmail.com and then post your cheque and order form. I will then reserve and put aside your plants. If your cheque has not been received by 21 March, your plants may be reallocated.

I continue to keep a record of those plants where demand exceeds supply, and if they are not readily available from garden centres, I'll try to get more of these propagated the following year. That way, if you miss out on your wanted plant this year, there will hopefully be another opportunity to purchase it in 2 -3 years time.

The letter attached to the number will indicate where it has been sourced from:

- P = Pukeiti;
- T = Tawa Glen Nursery;
- O = Members' Garden surplus.

All plants from Tawa Glen are in 2.5L pots. The Pukeiti sourced plants are in pots varying from 2.5L for all vireya rhododendrons to 10cm pots for some perennials and the size is specified with the plant description.

We do encourage members ordering plants to collect them in person, if possible. This optimises the condition of the plants you receive and decreases the cost to you. We would prefer those people living in New Plymouth to collect their plants from 12A Tamati Place, New Plymouth on Friday 29 March or by alternative arrangements made with Heather Robson. If this isn't possible you will be able to collect your plant orders from Pukeiti on Saturday 30 March. To enable this, please tick the appropriate box on the order form so your plants can be taken up to Pukeiti.

For those who can't collect their own order we will again be using Fastway Couriers. They have provided us and you with an excellent service over the past decade but should there be any problem with the delivery product then please tell the courier first before notifying Heather.

All plants are believed to be correctly named and we endeavor to describe them as accurately as possible, but size and flowering is a rough guide only as this can vary according to very localised conditions.

Please use the guide below to allow enough for the freight on your limited open-order cheque. There is no minimum order required.



Rhododendrons - Species

1T	<i>R. edgeworthii</i> : The leaves are covered with very fine hairs (dark orange to pale beige-brown). Flowers are bell-shaped, white or white flushed pink, may have yellow blotch at base and very fragrant. 1m	\$20.00
2T	<i>R. pleistanthum</i> : Upright growing to 1.2m. This form has good tight trusses of strong lilac flowers that have bright red spots flaring out on the upper lobe. (ss)	\$20.00
3P	<i>R. suoilenhense</i> : (pronounced swoe-lin-ense) open pollinated at Pukeiti from the best plant. A very special offering. It has been a long time since we have had any large-leaved rhododendrons on our list. 15m (ss)	\$20.00

Rhododendrons - Hybrids

4T	<i>R. 'Butterhorn'</i> : An American Maddenia hybrid with an upright habit, bronze new growth and fine bright yellow trumpet-shaped flowers in late spring. 1.8m November - December	\$20.00
5T	<i>R. 'Bell Heller'</i> : Medium-large globular trusses of white flowers with a prominent gold blotch on the upper lobe. October flowering. 1.5-2m	\$20.00
6T	<i>R. 'Coconut Ice'</i> : (<i>yakushmanum x aberconwayi</i>) A Pukeiti hybrid which grows into a compact shrub with dark green foliage. Flowers held in tight trusses starting as pink buds and opening to white blooms with rose edges. A very attractive effect. 1m Mid-season	\$20.00
7T	<i>R. 'Countess of Haddington'</i> : Loose trusses of 3-5 flowers are pink and cream and have a wonderful fragrance. Compact rounded plant grows to 1.2m. Early-mid season flowering.	\$20.00
8T	<i>R. 'David'</i> : Upright growing plant with deep green leaves. Conical trusses of deep red show off the contrasting white stamens. Early-mid season (ss)	\$20.00
9T	<i>R. 'Floral Gift'</i> : Mark Jury hybrid which grows into a compact shrub, especially if pruned after flowering. With all parents heavily perfumed it is not surprising that 'Floral Gift' is also heavily perfumed. Flowers of heavy texture in creamy white, flushed pink with a green to yellow throat. 1.8m	\$20.00
10T	<i>R. 'Frosted Ice'</i> : Like <i>R. 'Coconut Ice'</i> this is another <i>Yakushmanum x aberconwayi</i> hybrid bred at Pukeiti by Graham Smith. It also has a nice compact habit but the flowers are pure white. Attractive, dark green foliage. 1m Mid-season	\$20.00
11T	<i>R. 'Lemon Lodge'</i> : A New Zealand hybrid with huge, primrose-yellow flowers on a compact plant. Very free flowering and a highly sought after plant. 1.5m Oct flowering	\$20.00
12T	<i>R. 'Morning Magic'</i> - <i>yakushmanum</i> x 'Springbok': Neat compact shrub, ideal in an open site. Iridescent white flowers, flushed pale pink with pronounced ochre spotting.	\$20.00
13T	<i>R. 'Opal Dawn'</i> : Buds of rose opal flushed cream, open to camellia rose, fading white with a pink flush and yellowish flare. Fragrant. 80cm	\$20.00
14T	<i>R. 'Pink Cushion'</i> - <i>yakushmanum</i> F.C.C. x 'Mayday': This wonderful yak hybrid has excellent foliage and a compact rounded plant. Flowers are in tight rounded trusses of soft pink that hold their colour well. 1.3m	\$20.00
15T	<i>R. 'Summer Cloud'</i> : A compact well shaped plant with good sized trusses of white with a small green flare from the throat. Good foliage. Mid-late season. 1.5m	\$20.00
16T	<i>R. 'Tanyosho'</i> : Compact well rounded plant with pink buds opening to white bell shaped flowers. 1m	\$20.00
17T	<i>R. 'Vesuvius'</i> : Flowers are bright vermilion red in well-shaped trusses of 12-15 flowers. The compact plant is late flowering very much like <i>griersonianum</i> (ss)	\$20.00

Vireya Rhododendron – Species

18P	<i>R. archboldianum</i> : We are pleased to have more of this plant available so those who missed out last year have a second chance to purchase one. This rhododendron, which is currently red-listed, is both a wonderful garden plant and of interest to collectors. The bright pink, curved flowers are trumpet shaped, and held in umbels of up to 15 flowers. They burst outwards from the centre of the truss and Graham Smith named Pukeiti's specimen 'Starburst'. One main flowering in late summer and sporadically through the year. Well rounded shrub. 1.5m	\$20.00
19P	<i>R. arenicola</i> : Small bronze/green leaves on a slender plant. Salmon pink tubular flowers. (ss) 1.5m	\$20.00
20P	<i>R. hyacinthosmum</i> : A well rounded plant with large, pale pink flowers that have a deeper pink edge. 1.5m (ss)	\$20.00
21P	<i>R. rugosum</i> : (thin leaves) Attractive foliage with wrinkled, deeply veined narrow leaves. Flowers are bright pink. Up to 2m in the garden. (ss)	\$20.00

- 22P *R. rarilepidotum*: A rounded shrub with shiny green leaves and bright, burnt orange flowers appearing throughout the year. 1.5m (ss) \$20.00
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- 23P *R. jasminiflorum* spp. *jasminiflorum*: A strong growing, somewhat sprawling plant with reddish stems and green/grey leaves. The white flowers are blushed with pink and highly scented. Main flowering is spring. (ss) \$20.00
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Vireya Rhododendron - Hybrids

- 24P *R. 'Gardenia Odyssey'*: Tall upright plant with large green/yellow buds opening to a large, pale orange flower with a hint of pink. Scented (ss) \$20.00
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- 25P *R. 'Haloed Gold'* – *R. christiana*e x *R. 'Tropic Glow'*: Upright growing plant that flowers throughout the year. The bright yellow flowers are attractively edged with a thin red line. An attractive and easy to grow garden plant. 2m (ss) \$20.00
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Shrubs

- 26P *Agapetes buxifolia*: A very special offering because of its rarity. This, up to 1.5m epiphytic shrub grows in damp forests in N.E. India. It is characteristic of all *Agapetes* but compared to the more common *A. serpens* its leaves are larger, (up to 2.5-3 x 1.5cm) and a brighter, more shiny green. The tubular flowers are a uniform bright red. The five fused petals form a bulbous tube then separate at the tips and flare attractively around the emergent stigma. White fruit follow the flowers. 10cm pot (ss) \$15.00
-
- 27P *Agapetes hosseana*: An attractive cousin of the blueberry, this rare offering grows epiphytically from S Myanmar to Laos. Similar in habit to *A. buxifolia* this is described as a small evergreen shrub with dark red tubular flowers that can tolerate light frost. The globular, red-speckled fruit are as attractive a feature as the flower. 10cm pot (ss) \$15.00
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- 28P *Gaultheria pyrolloides*: Japanese Wintergreen. An easily grown, evergreen plant, it succeeds in most situations but prefers a moist, acidic, humus rich soil in shade or semi-shade where it can be used as a ground cover. The white, scented flowers are flushed pink and the blue-black fleshy fruit that follow are edible. 13cm pot. 25m \$15.00
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Perennials

- 29O *Arisaema tortuosum*: The tallest and one of the most cold-hardy of the arisaemas, the 1m+ tall stalk emerges in early summer, putting up two large, tropical palmate leaves spreading wide. As the leaves unfurl, the pitcher-shaped green spathe atop the lengthening stem opens to reveal a long whip-like spadix or 'tongue' in green, or sometimes shaded purple, extending another 30 or more centimetres above. In autumn, bright red berries take the place of this long lasting bloom. A wonderful plant for the woodland garden and it's the closest you'll get in New Zealand to having a snake in your garden. \$10.00
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- 30O *Astilbe X arendsii 'Wiesse Gloria'*: A medium height (50 -90cm) astilbe cultivar with pure mid-green foliage. In summer, very white flower plumes on whitish-green stems rise above the foliage. These plumes are so soft in texture and colour that the effect when planted en masse is like a feathery cloud. This astilbe will pair with virtually anything in the garden. Will tolerate full sun provided it is kept moist. \$7.00
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- 31O *Disporopsis pernyi*: [sold at the Auckland Garden Show as 'evergreen Solomon's Seal']. An evergreen, rhizomatous perennial forming dense patches in full or partial shade. The lance shaped glossy dark green leaves grow to 20cm tall. The white, reflexed flowers, normally produced in pairs in early summer, are about 2cm long and lemon scented. This plant makes a terrific tall groundcover for deep shade. \$7.00
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- 32P *Podophyllum 'Spotty Dotty'*: The large, lobed umbrella-like leaves are chartreuse with dramatic chocolate-brown spotting when new, with the green darkening and the spots fading as summer progresses. In spring, clusters of five or more large, garnet-coloured flowers hide themselves under the leaves. Plant it in a tall pot, or on a bank above a walkway so it's easier to see this amazing flower, but this plant is worth putting in the moist shade garden for its vegetative features alone. 1L pot \$10.00
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- 33P *Helenium bigelovii 'Walstrand'*: Its common name is 'Sneezewood', not because it causes allergies but because it was originally used for snuff. In the sunflower family it grows into a rosette of small green leaves and in summer a 75cm – 1m tall stem will produce golden daisy-like blossoms. The flowers are bright rusty-yellow at first turning a more reddish-brown as they age. One plant can produce as many as 20 flower heads, either one per branch or in branching arrays. Plant in full sun to light shade with regular water. 1.5L pot \$7.00
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- 34P *Myosotidium hortensia*: Chatham Island Forget-me-not. This plant really needs no description for New Zealanders. With its large deep green, ribbed leaves and a profusion of deep blue flowers in early spring it is a stunner in any shady situation with moist soil and good drainage. Mulch in spring, water regularly during hot periods and feed regularly with liquid seaweed. 13cm pot \$10.00
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
